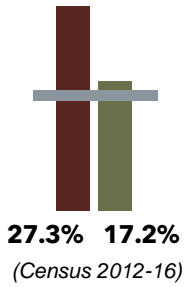

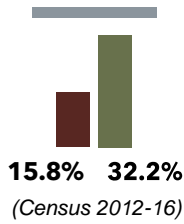

#### Median Household Income (Census 2012-16)



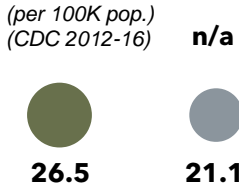
#### Crime Rate (per 1K pop.) (TBI 2017)



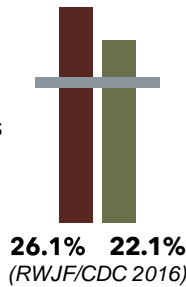

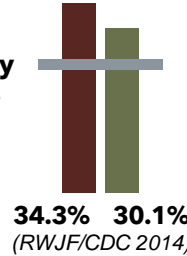
#### Drug Overdose Deaths (per 100K pop.) (CDC 2012-16)



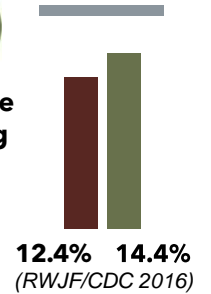

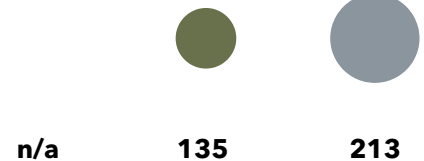
#### Uninsured Rate, Age <65 (Census 2016)

#### Mental Health Providers (per 100K pop.) (RWJF/CMS 2017)

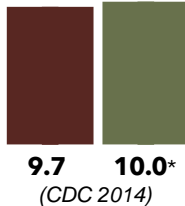

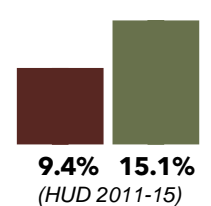

For example, the county with the highest diabetes rate ranks 95<sup>th</sup>. Due to data availability, only 72 counties are ranked for overdose deaths and 87 counties for mental health providers.
